

Session 3A - How Opening a Restaurant has Made Me a Better Band Director: Parallels, Connections, and Considerations



Braddock's Cask & Table opened in July of 2024 in Macon, GA. Ingrid Davis is Co-Owner and Executive Chef; I am Co-Owner while serving as Director of Bands at Mercer University. In the process of opening the restaurant, I have drawn connections and parallels between the culture of a restaurant and the culture of a band program. This session aims to connect those parallels and show how different parts of your life can reinforce what we do every day in the band room.



Are you an instrumentalist who doesn't know how to stop being hoarse all the time? Unfortunately these are issues many music educators deal with and learn to manage the hard way. But there's hope! You can learn from someone who's unfortunately done many things the wrong way and can share experiences, tips, tricks, and resources to help you avoid the same problems.

Amy Rever-Oberle is a veteran music educator of 17 years. After earning her bachelor's degree from Wayne State University, she spent the early part of her career as a K-12 band and music director, and had the opportunity to fall in love with teaching beginning band and middle school students. Amy gets to do that every day as the band director at Hart Middle School in Rochester Hills for nearly ten years. She has been a regular presenter at the Michigan Music Conference, hosting sessions on utilizing technology in band, Genius Hour, selecting music by historically excluded composers, and maintaining physical health as a band director. She is a proud member of Women Band Directors International and is president-elect for the Michigan chapter. She was honored to co-present at the 2024 Women Band Directors International Conference about helping students to develop independent musicianship. 

Dr. Mandell completed a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Wind Conducting from Rutgers University, studying with Dr. Kraig Alan Williams. She served as director of the Rutgers Concert Band, regularly guest conducted the Rutgers Wind Ensemble, and worked with the Marching Scarlet Knights

and the Rutgers pep bands. Her doctoral research has been presented at state, regional, national, and international conferences. Previously, Dr. Mandell held the position of Assistant Band Director at the University of Notre Dame. She earned a Master of Music degree in Music Education from Arizona State University, where she worked as a graduate assistant for the athletic band program and instructed the Sun Devil Marching Band. She earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education from the University of Massachusetts Amherst. Dr. Mandell is an experienced educator whose background includes a combination of several specializations, contributing to a multi-faceted approach to teaching music. She has been an educator in the marching arts for many years and actively serves as an adjudicator, clinician, and consultant for marching bands across the country.

Dr. Shayna Stahl is the Associate Director of Bands/ Director of Athletic Bands at the University of Kentucky. In this role, Dr. Stahl serves as the Director of the "Wildcat Marching Band," the UK Pep Bands and as the conductor of the UK Symphony Band. Prior to her appointment at the University of Kentucky, Dr. Stahl was Associate Director of Bands and Director of Athletic Bands at UNC Charlotte, the conductor of the Symphonic Band and taught courses in conducting and marching band



techniques. Prior to UNC Charlotte, Dr. Stahl served for three years as the Director of Athletic Bands at Stony Brook University and seven years as the Coordinator of Athletic Bands and music educator in the Middle Country Central School District where she taught Wind Ensemble, Concert Band and Jazz Band.

Dr. Stahl holds a Bachelor of Music Education from Temple University, a Master of Arts in Liberal Studies from Stony Brook University, a Master of Music Education/Wind Band Conducting from The Hartt School at the University of Hartford and a Doctor of Musical Arts in Instrumental Conducting from the University of Washington. While at the University of Washington, Dr. Stahl was awarded first prize in the American Prize in Conducting - Band/Wind Ensemble (Community Division) in 2017 – 2018 and 2018 – 2019.

Dr. Stahl is active across the United States as a guest conductor, clinician, judge, and drill writer. She is currently a member of the National Association for Music Education (NAfME), College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), Women Band Directors International, Sigma Alpha Iota and an honorary member of Kappa Kappa Psi.

#### Session 6 - Confessions of a Burnt Out Band Director

In this session, I will share my personal journey through the challenges of burnout as a band director, delving into the intersections of my professional and personal life that ultimately led to this overwhelming experience. I'll discuss how the demanding


nature of the job, coupled with feelings of isolation, contributed to burnout and how this affected my well-being and

effectiveness as an educator.

Through storytelling and reflection, I will highlight the pivotal moments that led me to seek therapy and offer insights into how I regained balance. I'll also discuss the lessons learned in hindsight, focusing on strategies for preventing burnout and building supportive networks.

Kaylie Hutcheon is a seasoned educator holding both a Bachelor's and a Master's degree in Music Education and Education from Central Michigan University. Kaylie spent over a decade teaching K–12 music in both Walkerville Public Schools and Suttons Bay Public Schools in Michigan, where she worked to develop music programs that fostered technical skills and a lifelong passion for music among her students. Currently, Kaylie is employed by the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians' Education Department, where she focuses on academic interventions and attendance support for Tribal students. Though certified to teach K–12 music in Michigan, she has shifted her focus to supporting educational initiatives within her community.

Kaylie is passionate about music's role in self-discovery and believes in tailoring her approach to meet the individual needs and goals of each student. Her former students have gone on to pursue musical opportunities at both regional and collegiate levels, and she continues to stay involved in music as a private lesson teacher at the Martha Meek Music Studio in Suttons Bay, her membership in Women's Band Directors International and the Northport Community Band. Outside of her professional work, Kaylie enjoys the natural beauty of Suttons Bay and is actively engaged in her community, including volunteering with Scouting America and supporting local youth arts, music, and sports programs.

Have you ever hit "the wall" of sound? Explore the roles of physical presence and gesture to learn to break through and become more involved with the sounds in your ensemble. Listening and communication concepts will allow you to develop your personal leadership to encourage responsively in the band, choir, or orchestra!

A dynamic conductor of both wind band and orchestral ensembles, Leah McGray is currently the Conductor of the Wind Orchestra at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada. Previously, she was the Director of Instrumental Studies for the State University of New York at Geneseo, and Rhodes College in Memphis TN, conducting the Geneseo Symphony Orchestra, Geneseo Wind Ensemble, the Rhodes College Orchestra and Wind Ensemble, and teaching classes in conducting and musicianship. Dr. McGray earned her degrees from



Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, the University of Toronto, and Acadia University. She is in demand internationally as an adjudicator and has been a guest conductor for youth orchestras and honour bands across the United States, South Korea, and Canada, including the 2023 National Youth Band of Canada. Twice awarded major research grants, her scholarship explores techniques of non-verbal leadership, and wind ensemble repertoire by traditionally underrepresented composers.





### Session 10 - It's not me, it's you: Finding Joy after Leaving a Toxic Workplace

Have you ever felt that no matter how much you try to change your behaviors, how hard you work, and how much you do, you still aren't good enough for your job? Me too! Have you questioned whether or not you're even cut out for this career, or teaching in general? Same. Have you been gaslighted into believing "this is just how our profession is?" Been there. After experiencing complete burnout, feeling like a disappointment and a complete failure, I realized a secret: Even the Most Beautiful Flowers Won't Bloom in Toxic Soil. With a good therapist, I was able to make a series of difficult decisions, and believing this profession could be as beautiful as I imagined, I have gone from barely surviving to thriving. In this session, we will look at potential red flags in a workplace, strategies on how you might be able to thrive in your current environment with adaptations, and strategies for transplanting yourself if the environment is untenable. We will consider research that shows why women are more susceptible to burnout in this field, and space will be held for attendees to share their experiences, collaborate, and problem solve in ways we might all move forward to a truer, more beautiful version of ourselves and our careers.

Dr. Shannon Shaker holds the position of Assistant Professor, Director of Bands at Grand Rapids Community College. She leads the Wind Ensemble, Campus Band, and Jazz Ensemble along with other music classes in the department. In addition to her work at Grand Rapids Community College, Shannon is the founder and artistic director of a summer community band, Beer City Winds based in Grand Rapids. Shannon served as Director of Bands and Music Education at Frostburg State University in Frostburg, Maryland from 2018 - 2020. During her time at Frostburg State University,



Shannon holds a Doctorate of Musical Arts in Wind Conducting from Arizona State University where she was a conducting student of Gary W. Hill, and served as a teaching assistant in the wind band program. In 2016, Shannon earned her Masters of Music in Wind Conducting with John E. Williamson. Before pursuing graduate studies, Shannon completed her Bachelor of Music Education at Central Michigan University, and taught music to students of all ages in Eagle County, CO and Ypsilanti, MI.

Shannon is active in the professional music community. She is a member of the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), College Music Society, National Association for Music Education, World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE), the National Association for Music Education, and Women Band Director International (WBDI). 

#### Session 12 -Breaking the Glass Podium

This session will explore the anticipated research on the lived experiences of female band directors in a traditionally male-dominated field. This study aims to examine women's challenges, successes, and resilience in instrumental music education. Female band directors often face gender biases, limited mentorship opportunities, and the pressure to balance professional and personal responsibilities in ways their male counterparts may not. These factors can impact career advancement, job satisfaction, and representation in leadership roles within music education. As this research is still in the early stages, the session will outline the study's objectives, anticipated themes, and the importance of gathering firsthand accounts from female band directors. Key focus areas will include professional identity, work-life balance, leadership development, and advocacy for gender equity in band directing.


Karen Dowdy is a dedicated educator and doctoral candidate in the College of Education at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton, Texas. She currently serves as an Assistant Band Director at Jonesboro ISD in Jonesboro, Texas, where her leadership has contributed to a remarkable tripling of enrollment numbers in the band program at this 1A school. With nine years of experience in education, including four years specifically in music education and three years as a Color Guard Director, Karen has developed a deep understanding of the dynamics within music education programs.

Karen's doctoral dissertation, "Breaking the Glass Podium: The
Lived Experiences of Female Band Directors in a Male-Dominated
Field," examines women's unique challenges and experiences in music
education leadership positions. Through her research, she aims to highlight the systemic
barriers female band directors encounter and identify potential pathways toward more
significant professional equity.

As someone who has navigated multiple demanding roles simultaneously, Karen brings a unique perspective to her research and teaching. Her experience as a military spouse and pilot's wife has equipped her with exceptional adaptability and resilience. She has consistently balanced her professional responsibilities with her academic pursuits while embracing her role as a bonus mom to two pre-teenagers. Karen's ability to overcome obstacles and excel in multiple domains exemplifies the determination and multifaceted leadership capabilities many women in male-dominated fields must develop. Her research and advocacy work are informed by scholarly inquiry and lived experience, positioning her to make meaningful contributions to conversations about gender equity in music education and beyond.



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
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
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
